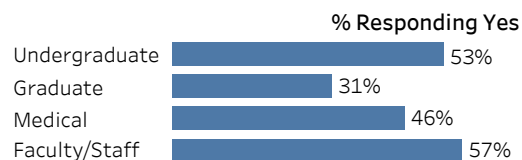


Department of Public Safety Community Survey 2023-24

Brown's Department of Public Safety (DPS), as part of its self-assessment and reaccreditation process, administered a survey to get a sense of how they were serving the community. This report shows the responses by population.

Interactions

In the past two years, have you personally had an interaction with a member of the Department of Public Safety?



53% of all respondents had an interaction in the past two years.

Interacting with a team member in the community was the most commonly reported recent interaction with DPS.

95% of all respondents reported being given a clear explanation about what was happening.

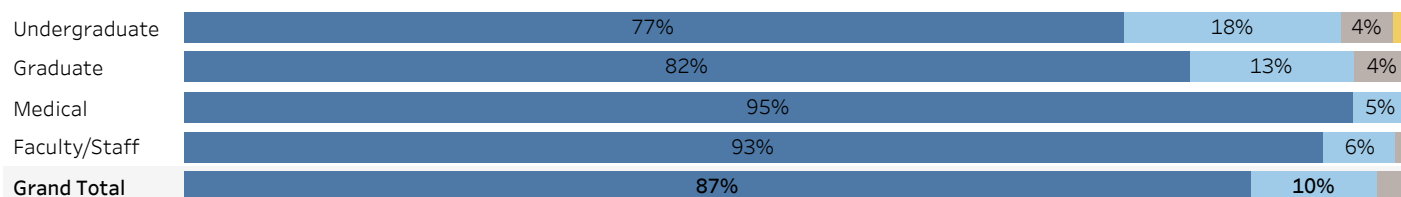
Of respondents who interacted most recently with a dispatcher:

93% agreed the dispatcher answered their questions or directed them to someone who could help.

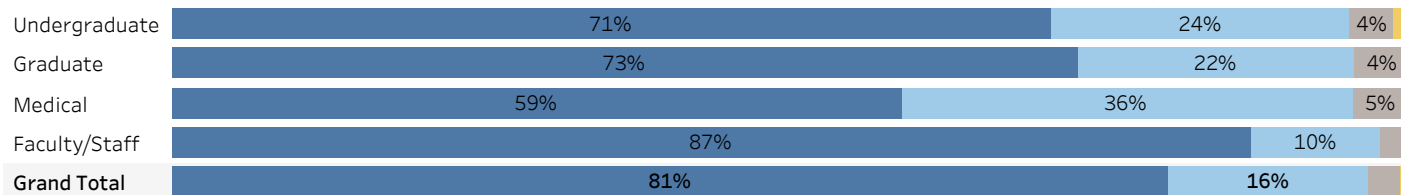
How would you rate the level of professionalism you were shown?

Somewhat Unprofessional | Very Unprofessional



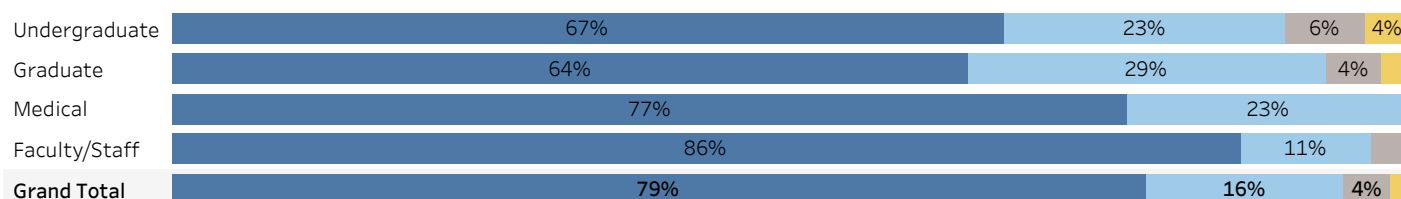
How knowledgeable was this person?

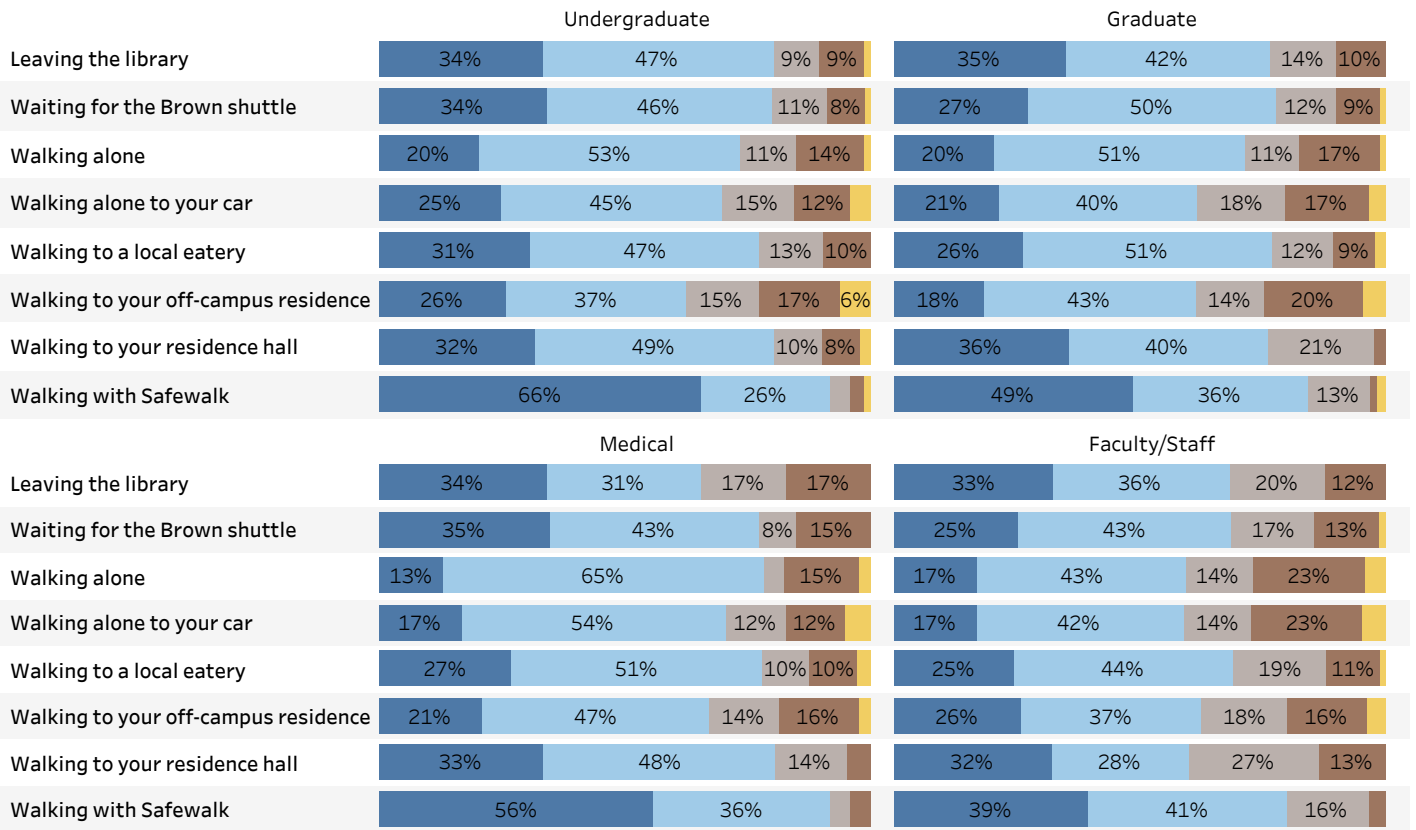
Respondents were interested in a variety of programs but expressed greatest interest in personal safety sessions and safety tips/media campaigns.

How safe do you feel at Brown after dark?

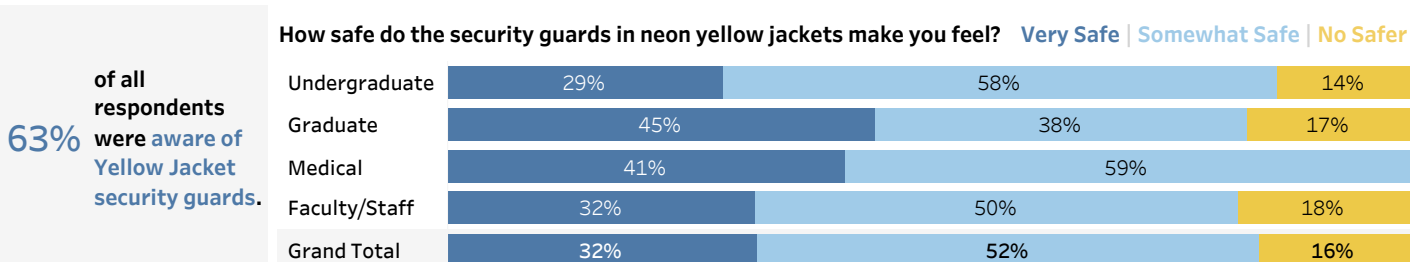
Very Safe | Somewhat Safe | Neither Safe nor Unsafe

A variety of accommodations would make respondents feel safer on campus, but overall **increased lighting** and **increased access to transportation** were most reported.

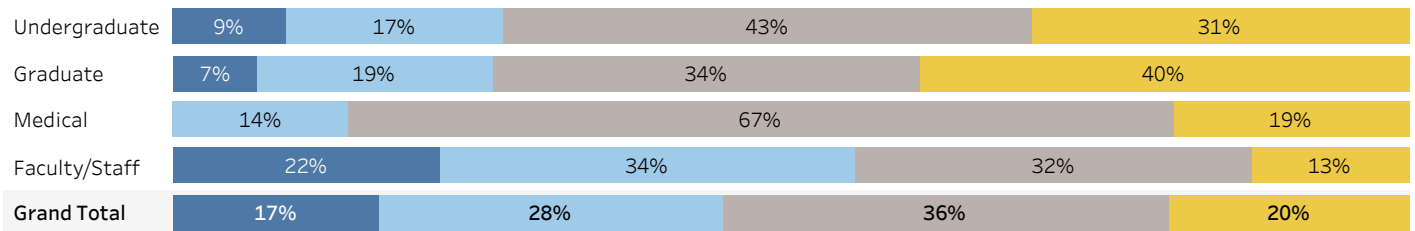

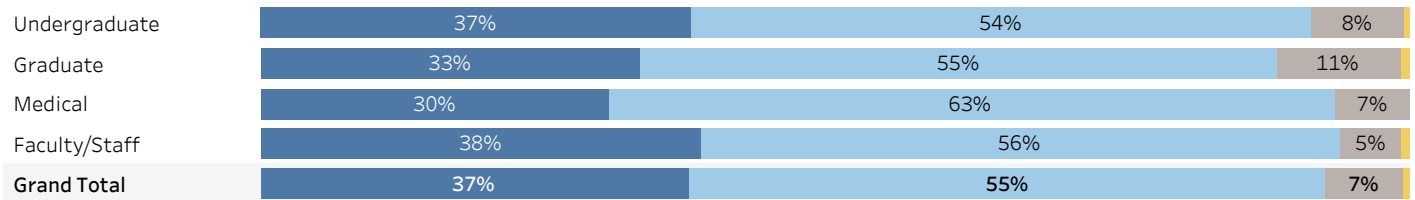
How often does DPS visit your department/building?

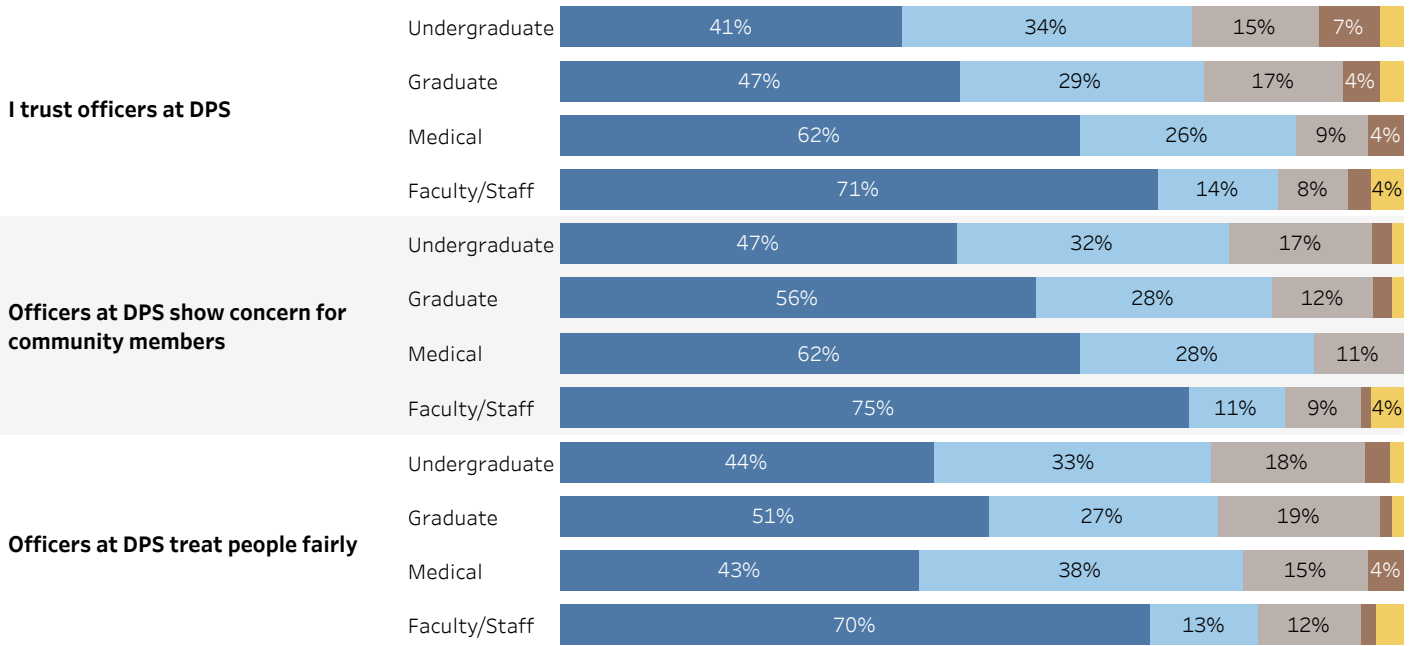

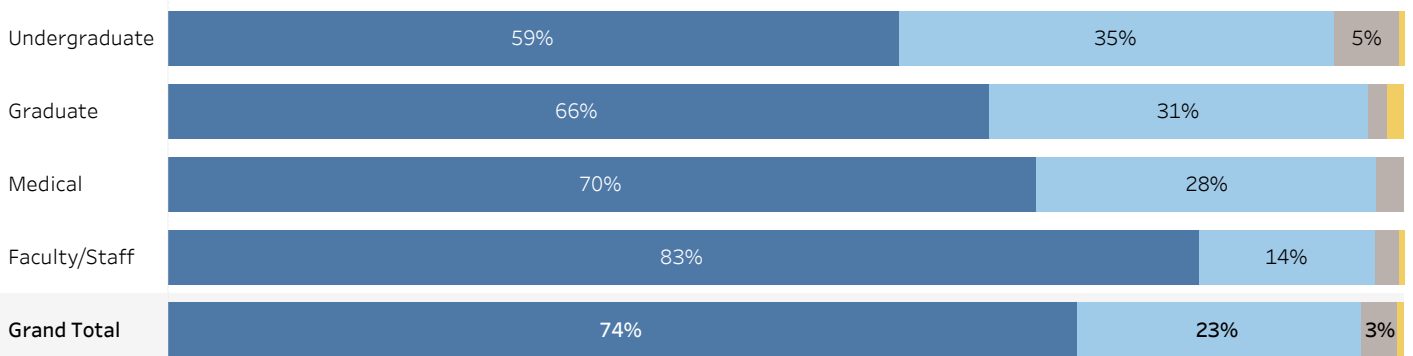
81% of all respondents agreed they **trust officers at DPS**.

80% of all respondents agreed officers at DPS **treat people fairly**.

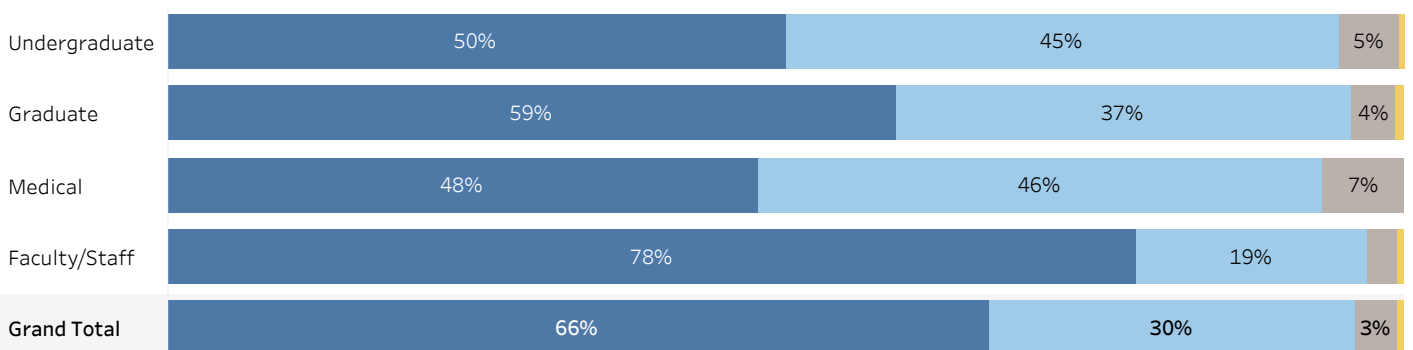
How would you rate the attitudes/behaviors of officers toward members of the Brown Community?

Somewhat Incompetent | Very Incompetent

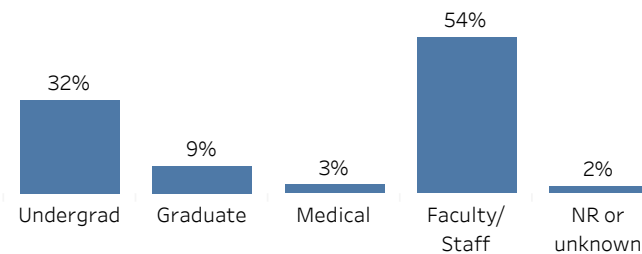


Respondent Demographics

Just **over half** of respondents were **faculty/staff**. **Undergraduates** represented the **largest portion** of the other half.

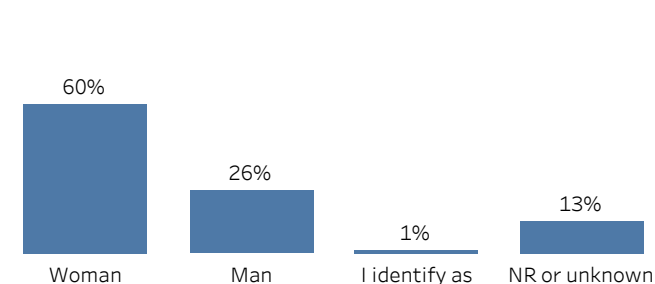

Women represented the **majority** of respondents.

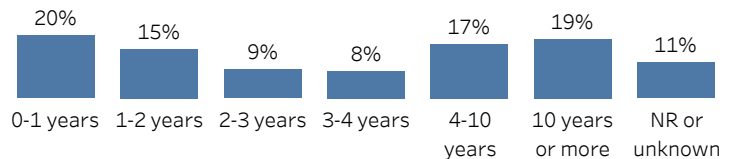

The **timeframes** respondents have been a part of the Brown community **varied**.

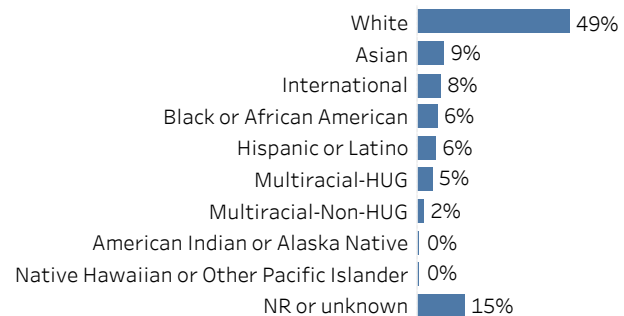

Notes on Demographics:

The Demographics page shows "Not Reported (NR) or unknown" category for respondents who could not be classified into demographic groups. Elsewhere in the report, NR or unknown are excluded from analyses.

Historically Underrepresented Group (HUG) is a term used for racial/ethnic groups that have been historically underrepresented in higher education. **HUG** includes those who identify as: American Indian or Alaska Native, Black or African American, Hispanic or Latino, and/or Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander. For the purposes of demographic analysis, individuals who selected more than one race/ethnicity were categorized into one of two groups. Respondents were categorized as **Multiracial-HUG** if they reported more than one race/ethnicity category and at least one of those race/ethnicity were within HUG. Respondents were categorized as **Multiracial-Non-HUG** if they reported more than one race/ethnicity category with none of those within HUG.
